Here is information regarding AP Drawing. Please understand that this is an intensive course that demands hours of work outside of class.

Summer Requirements:

- Sketchbook (will be used to sketch, develop ideas, jot down thoughts)
- Your sketchbook should reflect that you have consistently drawn or brainstormed throughout the summer o You must develop 2 potential investigation statements
 - o You must list ideas/create sketches for artwork that will explore your proposed investigations

Portfolio requirements to consider:

- You must select an investigation theme
- You have to be able to articulate your chosen investigation in a written description
- Your drawings should reflect constant evolution as you explore your investigation
- Your idea should be personally relevant or intriguing to you
- Risk taking is important; conventional or obvious choices will not score as high

Here are some suggestions to explore or spin off of:

- Assess your body of work: is there a common strength, idea, or theme that you could explore in depth
- Scale and cropping: how does your perception change when you selectively enlarge, diminish or crop (so many ways to play with this...)
- Metamorphosis: how can an idea or image evolve into something different or related
- Imagery that explores a specific ideal or emotion: alienation, love, death, conformity, freedom, social justice etc.
- Imagery that deliberately distorts or exaggerates
- Visual irony or humor
- Self-identity: how do you perceive yourself, how can you represent it visually?
